iNews from Apple

Joe Kukella left his post at Macintosh Systems Solutions' Apple Store in Key West to be our February speaker for UKMUG. Joe stepped in when Tom Mulhall was scheduled for hip replacement surgery the very day he was to speak! (The other hip... for those of you who remember him having done this before.) Tom is recovering nicely, and Joe is busier than ever, holding down the fort in Tom's absence, so we fell doubly blessed that he found time for us.

Joe said that Apple announced a 17" Mac Book Pro at MacWorld, but there aren't any available yet to be seen, so instead he concentrated on the software announcements made recently. The big news is the release of iLife and iWork '09. iLife is made up of iPhoto, Garage Band, iWeb, iMovie and iDVD. It was among these packages that Joe spent his time with us, giving us an overview of all the new features. Starting with iPhoto...

Events

iPhoto 08 would take photos that had a similar time and date and group them into an event folder automatically. iPhoto 09 gives you two new ways to organize your photos — Faces and Places:

Faces

Seeing Joe demonstrate this new feature was alone worth coming to the meeting to see. It is truly amazing. The New York Times calls this feature "The best tool for stalkers, ever!"

Faces is a new feature that allows you




All the major buzz this year so far is about enhancements to iLife & iWork. These come with new computers, but those with older models will need to purchase an upgrade for \$79. For most of the software, the Leopard operating system is required. iLife requires OS 10.5.6. The Leopard upgrade does not included the latest iWork and iLife; but there is a combo deal where you save 40% buying all three.

to organize your photos based on who's in them. iPhoto uses detection and face recognition to match faces that look like the same person. That makes it easy for you to add names to your photos and find the people you're looking for—even in the largest photo libraries.

Name the person in a photo, and iPhoto suggests possible matches you confirm with a click. iPhoto learns from this and sifts through your library to find more matches.

Click the Faces view to see a corkboard featuring a snapshot for each person you've named. Click the snapshot to see all the confirmed and suggested photos

of that person. Flip the snapshot to add a person's last name and Facebook ID. You can change which picture you see on top of the person's "stack."

Faces also lets you create peoplebased Smart Albums. Drag one or more snapshots to the Source list, and iPhoto generates a Smart Album that automatically updates every time you name and confirm more photos of those people.




Places


With Places, you can organize your photos by where they were taken.

It uses geo-tagging: data from GPS-enabled cameras or the camera on your iPhone to categorize photos by location. Places converts GPS location tags to geographic names. So pictures you took of the Eiffel Tower are labeled with easily searchable names like "France," "Paris," and "Eiffel Tower."

If you don't have a GPS-enabled camera or iPhone, you can still use Places. Type in the name of a place, enter an address, or drop a pin on a map. Then, when you want to find photos you shot in New York City or the Grand Canyon, just type the place name in the search field. If you feel like exploring, use the Places column browser to navigate your photos by clicking a country, state, city, or point of interest.



You can tag an entire event by clicking on the Event icon and identifying it, iPhoto knows the rest of the photos at that event were at the same place.



Travel Maps

iPhoto now has Maps in it – you need to be hooked to the Internet to make this work. All you do is zoom in and set a pin on the map where your event took place. You can see a terrain map, a satellite image or a hybrid. Zoom back out and click any pin to see that area of the map.

It's easy to make a book based on any Place, complete with maps. Click on the pin, click the Travel Book button, and auto flowing your photos from an event there. iPhoto lays out the book and drops in the map for you!

You can even show your progress during a journey – from point to point. The map will plot lines from one destination to another.

You can zoom and adjust the maps and pictures, and print copies of your book through Apple. (All book features require printing though Apple, you can't print them at home.) Cost is very reasonable, for example a 22-page 8.5x11 book with a hard cover is \$32. Several sizes and binding options are available, as are greeting cards.

You can also click on a Place and make a slideshow...

Themed Slideshows

Show off your photos onscreen with a slideshow. iPhoto '09 has six themes you can use to create slideshows in seconds. Themes include Classic, Shatter, Snapshots, Scrapbook, Ken Burns, and Sliding Panels. iPhoto uses face detection to position photos correctly and keep the faces onscreen.

A filmstrip at the bottom of the screen lets you navigate your slides with a click. You can also change the music or adjust the speed to go better with your photos. When you're happy with your slideshow, you can export it as a movie to iTunes and view it on your iPod, iPhone, or Apple TV.

Enhanced Photo Editing

iPhoto features all the editing tools you need to make your photos look their best. You can also apply some really cool effects to your photos, individually or as a group: Matte, Black and White, Sepia, Antique, faded colors and blurred edges. All editing is nondestructive to your original photos.

Online Sharing

iPhoto makes it easy to share photos using MobileMe, Facebook, and email. Publish photos directly to Facebook with just a few clicks. Select the photos you want to share and click the Facebook or Flickr button. When you share your photos on Flickr, the locations you added using Places appear on Flickr photo maps.



IMOVIE

iMovie has also gotten a makeover. The new features are:

Video Stabilization

Even the steadiest hand can jostle a camera. But now those perfect — if slightly wobbly — moments won't ruin your movie. New video stabilization in iMovie '09 analyzes how much your camera was moving while you were recording, then automatically reduces camera shake. The results look surprisingly smooth and professional.

Clip Inspector

It's easy to change the speed of a clip. Drop a clip from your library on top of a clip in your project to open a pop-up menu of edit options, including replace, insert, audio only, and more.

New Titles, Transitions, and Effects

Put the finishing touches on your movie with new titles, transitions, and video effects. There are 18 new animated titles an eight new transitions. To change the look of your movie, choose from 19 new one-click video effects, including Aged Film, Dream, Sci-Fi, and Cartoon.

Fast or slow motion adds comic relief or dramatic depth. Drag a slider to adjust the speed of any clip. Or reverse it with a click. Your adjustments happen in real time.

Dynamic Themes

Choose a theme such as Bulletin Board, Filmstrip, or Comic Book and apply it to your project instantly. You can add animated titles and sophisticated transitions. Choose a theme at *continued on page three*

the start of a project or apply a theme to an existing project. You can easily add, swap, or delete elements to customize your project.

Precision Editor

iMovie '09 introduces the Precision Editor: it displays a magnified filmstrip that shows exactly where one clip ends and the next begins so you can precisely edit your video. Skim each clip up close and identify how much to keep and where to cut. Edit audio and video independently, so you can use the sound from one clip with the video from another. Reposition and adjust the duration of titles, and more.

Animated Travel Maps

Ideal for documenting your vacations, holidays, and adventures, you can add eye-catching, animated travel maps. Choose from four different 3D globe or flat map styles and select your location (or locations) — from coun-



try to city to points of interest. iMovie builds an animated map that flies from point A to point B.

Full-Screen Library Browser

iMovie '09 makes it easy to enjoy your footage, even if you don't want to make a movie. The new, full-screen Library Browser puts your entire video library at your fingertips. Flip through video just as you flip through music in your iTunes library — using full-screen Cover Flow.



GARAGE BAND

You've always been able to mix your own music with Garage Band, but the focus in GB'09 is on learning to play!

Basic Lessons

GarageBand '09 introduces Basic Lessons: an easy way to learn piano and guitar, right on your Mac. Follow along at your own pace with interactive lessons that teach you the fundamentals through video instruction, synchronized notation, and animated onscreen instruments.

Create a site that's fun to visit by adding a few interactive widgets. iWeb '09 makes it drag-and-drop easy to add RSS feeds, iSight photos and videos, a countdown timer, YouTube videos, Google Maps, HTML snippets, and other dynamic features.

iWeb uses your MobileMe account information from System Preferences to publish the site. Manage multiple websites in iWeb with ease. Use the iWeb site organizer to reorganize, rename, or delete individual pages or entire websites. iWeb creates navigation menus for each site. And you can publish one site at a time — either to MobileMe or to another hosting service via FTP.

Disclaimer

Some iLife features, notably those in Garage Band, require an Intel chip to run.
