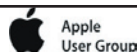

Four Free Web Tools for Groups

PB WORKS - for building websites
EVITE - for coordinating an event
DOODLE - for schedule coordination
SURVEY MONKEY - for following up.

What a useful set of tools! Special thanks to Karen Beal, Diane Marshall and MaryAnne Roper for introducing us to four very useful resources! I've already put two of them to use for UKMUG, and I thank those of you who followed the emails and played along.

PB WORKS

Formerly called PB WIKI, this is a tool for building a simple website that can be developed collaboratively by the members of a group, company or family. The term WIKI (as in Wikipedia) means collaboratively built.

The builder decides whether the site can be viewed by anyone or is private and can only be viewed by those allowed in. The idea is for a group to work together to build on an idea, or a project, through the site. For a family it could be a shared history and news site. For a business it could be used for communicating policy, collecting suggestions or accessing documents. Diane repeated a quote, that it is "like mspace or facebook on steroids."

To set one up is very simple. Go to pbworks.com and get started! You pick a color scheme, then create pages and folders (which are securely stored on the pbworks.com website for you, for free). Upload graphics and content. Mess with it until you're happy. Then

invite people to view it and participate. People can participate as reader, writers or as the administrator.

I set one up for UKMUG following the meeting. It took me about two hours, mostly because I took the time to index and upload all of this year's newsletters, as well as to scan and upload all of the old UKMUG photos I could find. I invited everyone to view, comment and contribute, and some did. Go see!

By the way, if you did visit, and if you are getting an email every time someone else visits (and this bugs you), go back in and change your account to turn notifications off. See page 2.

For free you get 100 users and 2GB of storage. There are some other restrictions but they aren't very limiting. This is pretty nice, for a no-cost website.

There is a training tutorial on PB fundamentals also available. Another PB site, built by Karen, is <http://klcommunitygarden.pbworks.com>.

There is also a free website building/hosting service on Google. Go to google.com and pull down the "more" menu to get started with that one.

SURVEY MONKEY

Survey Monkey is an easy way to collect data from a group of people and analyze it. The site, called surveymonkey.com, calls it "intelligent survey software for primates of all species."

It's easy to build a survey, and since you invite those who will respond, it's

Google Earth is a virtual globe, map and geographic information program. It maps the Earth by the superimposition of images obtained from satellite photos, aerial photography and 3D imagery.

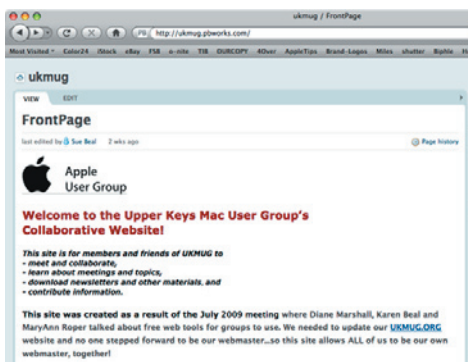
Kathy graciously agreed to brush up on it and show us how to get started. Google Earth is a huge and wonderful topic... you don't want to miss this one!

secure and private.

There are 20 types of questions you can ask, for example: simple answer, multiple choice, check a box, rating scale, essay box, numerical, voting... just to name some. A survey is limited to 10 questions, but they can be multiple-part, complex questions like: "rate each of these 15 items" or "have you ever (list 20 activities) - check all that apply..." questions.

You can even allow logical branching -- if they answer Yes, then ask this question; if No, ask something else.

There are templates to help you get started, and a tutorial.

The results are reported and interpreted for you, you can see the raw data, as well as graphs and charts of the results. Survey Monkey keeps all of your surveys on the site, over time.

The basic service is free, and with that you get 100 responses. You can upgrade for very reasonable rates, if you need to.

I did not have time to make a survey for you to test but there will probably be one coming, as soon as I can get a little time to set it up. Watch the MU for more details!

DOODLE

Doodle.com is a handy site that allows a group of people to coordinate their schedules for an event or meeting. It's free and easy to use. Both Karen and Diane have used it. Diane used it to set up a bicycle trip to Missouri with a group, and Karen uses it regularly to schedule field trips for the Orchid Club.

Here's how it works: You create a "poll" or question on the Doodle site. You give it the event info, then use a calendar to define a range of possible dates and times. You send out an email link to those whom you want to participate. They respond, and you follow

the results online as they vote.

When people respond they get the calendar-like set up, and they block in red-yellow-green (no good, ok, and good) as the schedule pertains to them.

EVITE


Evite makes the invitation and RSVP phases of an event easy! This one came to my attention when MaryAnne Roper used it to schedule a 90th birthday party for her mother.

MaryAnne showed us how easy it is the got to evite.com and do your own invitation. First you must register and sign in, then:

1. Choose a design/look. Upload images, pick stock ones, play with it.
2. Fill in the info - date, place, time, phone number, etc.
3. Set up how you want to get responses.
4. Pick options, like guests should be asked to pay or bring something.
5. Add email addresses and send it!
6. Sit back and get an email every time someone responds.

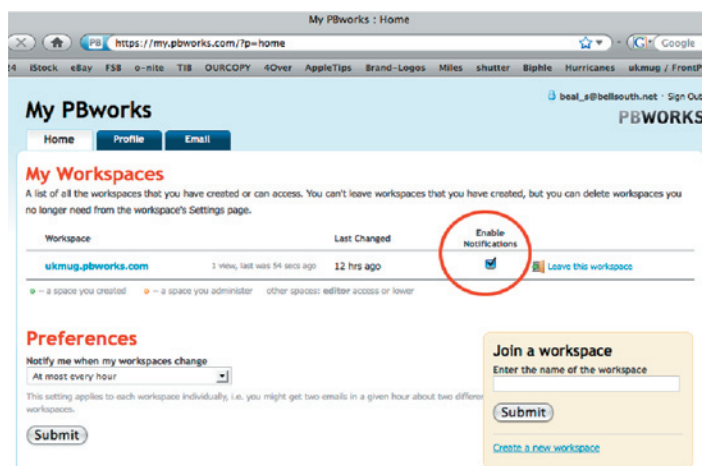
Pretty easy! Easy enough that all of you reading this got an evite invitation to our Google Earth meeting.

You can also use it for recurring events (it will send periodic email reminders), you can poll your guests, you can show everyone who else is coming or keep it private... there are lots of options.

You can also print and mail for the ones on your list who are not email-savvy.

About an inch down you'll see a line that starts with the name of the UKMUG website.

Scanning Photos for Use in iMovie

Sue asked me to share what I learned about scanning 35MM slides for use in iMovie and digital slide presentations. I have no plans to print them, but if I did, the largest print I would make would be 8 x 10.

Through some serendipity, a twenty minute appointment at the local Apple Store Genius Bar metamorphosed into a one hour One-to-One session with Scott, their team's expert in digital photography. Here are the highlights of what I learned.

Probably the most important thing I learned was a reference to a web site with the most comprehensive but simplified explanation of scanning and rendering color images I have seen. The writer's main audience was a person making hard copy pictures, not images for iMovie and iDVD. But he had more of what I wanted than I had found elsewhere. The url is above.

Scan at 600dpi.

The relationship between dpi and pixels is difficult to grasp, and in many ways they are unrelated. But a 35MM slide has tremendous detail imbedded in it. You probably need 400 dpi to capture enough of it to fill a TV screen. After all, regardless how big your TV set is, the finest resolution you can

possibly show is 640x480 pixels (up to 1280x720 with high definition). Scan at 600 dpi in case you decided to print a picture. If you think you will be making an 8x10, make a test print at 600dpi. If the quality is not good enough, then go to 1200dpi. Also in iMovie I will be using lots of Ken Burns affect which is the equivalent of cropping the original and then blowing it up to full screen.

Save to iPhoto in TIFF.

iPhoto normally saves in JPEG to create smaller data files. Every time

you change and save a JPEG file you lose quality. By the time you color correct, crop, etc and then manipulate the picture with Ken Burns, you might have saved the picture several times and lost quality. The TIFF files are larger, but they don't deteriorate no matter how many times you work with them. Even though the file is larger, storage costs are coming down fast.

I still have much to learn and would appreciate input from others about making images for iMovie and iDVD. ☺
