For folks eager to try a Mac but never wanted to plunk down the high price tag to get it, the Hackintosh—that is, a regular PC tweaked to run OS X—has always been an attractive option. That said, it's not something you should take on lightly unless you're willing—even enthusiastic—to build and maintain a PC entirely from scratch. I can't guarantee it'll be easy, but if you follow this guide step-for-step (it's exhaustive) and stick with the same (or at least roughly the same) hardware as I am, I can vouch for a rock solid system that also happens to cost a good deal less than you'd pay for a comparable Mac.

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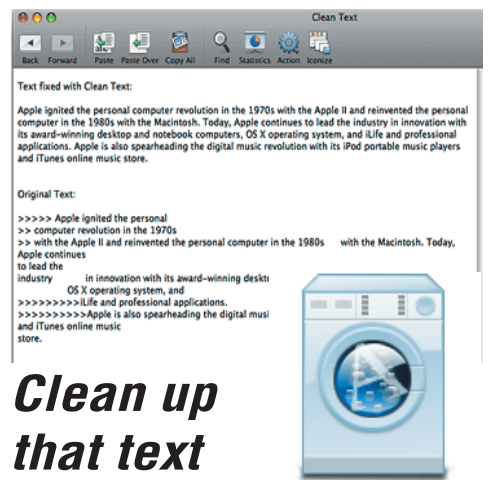
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Clean up that text

Eliminates all text formatting

Apimac has released new versions of Clean Text, a tool dedicated to webmasters, graphic designers and magazine editors to reduce text cleanup time. Clean Text eliminates all text formatting and performs other useful functions, such as removing empty lines, removing unwanted spaces, removing tab characters, converting smart quotes, tabs, returns, and more.

It's a must when you have to paste some text copied from one document or application into another, and you want the text to get the attributes (such as color, font, dimension and style) of the new document instead of preserving the attributes copied from the old one. What's more, the brand new Quick Clean action let you solve with a single click the most common cleaning problems of text found in email messages, documents and web pages.

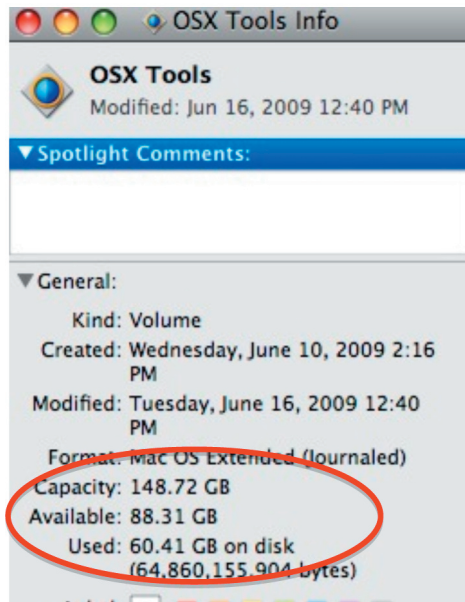


TIPS FROM TOM:

We often get asked: "my computer put up a message that I was running low on disk space, what does that mean?", or "I keep getting messages that I am low on disk space, but I just click okay and they go away".

Well-- those messages are very real, and are being sent by your operating system at very precise times (or, more correctly, very certain low space percentages). Your computer uses free disk space for many, many things, as do most if not all of the programs (applications) that you use each day. Sufficient free disk space is essential to the proper operation of your system and the programs on that system; the 'low disk space' messages are set to trigger at three particular points. When 1) your free space falls below the minimum recommended for your particular hard drive size; then 2) your free space has now become dangerously low and can/will affect the operation of your system; and lastly, 3) your free space has now become so low that your almost certain to have a corrupted directory (the 'card catalog' of your system) and most likely will corrupt files as well.

If you reach the third message it is almost certain that you will face a system crash in the near future; recovery from which is not certain and very difficult to repair.



In general, the Rule of Thumb to follow is to always leave -at least- 10% of your total hard drive free. If you have a 120Gb hard drive, at least 12Gb should remain free-- minimum, and so on. You can check this easily at any time by simply selecting your hard drive on the desktop (a single click), then under File in the menu bar select Get Info-- a window similar to this will appear and will show your drive Capacity, Available (this is the important one) and Used. Remember, for the good health of your system, never let your hard drive available space fall below 10% of the drive capacity.

Some interesting info to share: I have a 2GB standard San Disk SD card for a digital frame. I loaded photos and eventually got the message that the photo couldn't be moved because there was no more free space. Get info showed 1.69GB available with 149.7MB used. I tried everything I know to no avail so I emailed Tech Support at San Disk. This is their reply:

"The issue you are encountering is may have been due to FAT limitation. This means that there is a maximum amount of files that you can save on the root directory of your card. When transferring files to the memory card/USB flash drive, you may want to organize them into folders or format it in the FAT 32 file system."

So I moved a few photos off, created a folder, moved all the photos into the folder and then added more. And all is well and I learned something new! ☺

Free movie and DVD authoring software. Free website creation software. Free music player/burner. Free music creation software. Its called iLife. And this was all written to just work with all Macs. Nothing to install. No drivers that need signing to work. And this doesn't even cover the calendar, mail, address book and more that everybody gets standard.

Suppose you want to write a letter, create a spread sheet, or a presentation. For only \$90 more you can buy iWork. Besides being easy to use, they open/save MSWord, Excel and PowerPoint documents. How many hundreds of dollars would a copy of Office cost you?

And don't get me started on Mac OS superiority on security. The last Mac virus was the 'AutoStart' last century!

Last, what is your time worth to you. I see thousands of PC questions in this Yahoo forum that aren't an issue with the Mac. How many hours have Windoze users spent researching their issue just to get back to doing something (anything) on their computers.

Mac Users have never experienced the "blue screen of death." Or had to deal with the frustration of P-n-P meaning PLUG AND PRAY. How much time do PCers spend just trying to

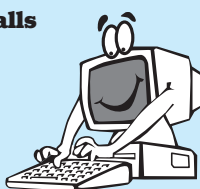
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
