Snow Leopard: what's to come.

Our speaker in November was Joe Kukella from Macintosh Systems Solutions in Key West, on the new Snow Leopard operating system.

Snow Leopard is an evolutionary, not revolutionary release, a set of improvements to Leopard, which is the best selling OS Apple has ever released.

Leopard had some great innovations and has been very well received, but it went out with some of the planned improvements missing. Many of the missing functions were things you'd never even notice, but they will set the stage for what's to come next. Snow Leopard (OS 10.6, released in August 2009) has the foundations in place for the future, and it's being marketed as "Leopard Improved."

Over 1,000 parts of Leopard were improved and 90% of the OS refined in Snow Leopard! Who knew it needed it? Specifically, some of the highlights:

The Finder

It doesn't look any different, but under the hood, the Finder has been updated with a new services manager, new eject manager, fewer spinning wait cursors, faster emptying of trash, faster cancellations, enhanced icon previews, and new "put back from trash" function.

The Dock has been improved and Exposé enhanced. The system compresses itself after install, making it efficient in the hard drive space it uses.


Preview's rewrite and open JPG functions are two and a half times faster, and opening PDFs is also speeded up. You can now select text by column in Preview, which is an important function if you ever try to copy text out of a PDF.

International Support

I'm willing to bet only one or two of you needs this, but there's better support for Chinese characters in the OS now, and a viewable palette for selecting Asian characters.

Mail Improved

Mail has also been improved, moving messages around faster, searching faster and launching faster.

Safari Version 4

Even if you don't have Snow Leopard you can upgrade to Safari version 4, which benchmarks at Acid3's 100% adherence to standards for rendering web pages. Javascript is running 50% faster and Safari is using 64 bit computing to run better and faster.

Also new in Safari is crash protection. Used to be that a bad plug-in could bring all of Safari crashing down. Now

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it has protection so that only that part goes down and it restarts itself.

Quicktime X

Quicktime has been rewritten from the ground up with a new, streamlined foundation and interface. We now have HTTP streaming (you can stream from your computer's built-in camera to the internet!), and basic QT editing functions are now included (without having to buy Quicktime Pro); it works a lot like iMovie. Screen captures for movies are now supported - meaning, you can capture 10-20 snippets of video. It's easy to record and save your recording into iTunes, then share it from there.

Behind the Curtain

The new technologies you can't see are in the areas of RAM and the processors.



64-Bit Technology

This really gets into the deep end of how your computer works. Our word size used to be 32 bit, which limited the size of addressable memory and the throughput of the processors. Now the Mac has gone to 64 bit technology. The improvement isn't just doubly better. Addressability of RAM went from 4GB under 32 bits to 16 Billion GB under 64 bits! And the 64-bit processors are twice as fast!

Grand Central Dispatch

"GCD" allows the OS to take advantage of processors in your Mac making



it faster. The GCD manages threads of processing and can use up to 8 processing cores at once. I am not sure what all that means but Joe says it uses less energy and helps laptops run cooler with longer battery life!

Open CL

Previously, processors in your Mac were dedicated in function. Now the Mac will utilize any idle capacity from graphics processors to speed up other functions. The framework which allows this is called Open CL and it's a technology which will benefit us in the time to come, as third party makers of hardware and software come on board to take advantage of it.

Windows Exchange Support

MicroSoft Exchange is a way to connect email, calendar and apps between home and office. With Snow Leopard we can now interface our Mac soiftware counterparts to the PC ones. Snow Leopard has made it easy, all you need is a password.

Cost and Requirements

Snow Leopard comes on new Macs, and is available as an upgrade to Leopard users for just \$29. A family 5-pack is just \$49.

Upgrading from Tiger costs \$169, and for that you also get a boxed set of all the iLife and iWork 09 applications.

Minimum requirements: an Intel Processor with at least 1 GB of memory and 5 GB free disk space. You need a DVD drive to install it.

The Joe Show Live!

All the previous notes were from watching Apple's canned presentation on the new OS. Joe continued, demonstrating features as he talked.

Exposé

Hit F3 and see all the open windows on your desktop line up and miniaturize to fit. Place the cursor over any one of them and see it enlarge.

Use command-1 to rearrange all those windows into alphabetical order, or command-2 to see them sort by application or type.

Hover over an application in the Dock and get an Exposé window of only that application's windows.

Use Escape or F3 again to get out of the Exposé view.

Dock

Hover over the Dock. Only open applications will light up. You've been able to add folders to the Dock for some time, but now if you select one of those folders, a new menu pops up with list view or grid view. You can click on the contents right there and open them.

Help

Help (Mac Help) is an excellent place to search for what you need to know. Help is available for the Finder itself, and in any Apple application. Pay attention to what program you are in when you search for Help - make sure it's in the one you want.

There's also help available on Apple's website - click on the Mac tab and look down the page for tutorials, FAQs and other useful info.

Safar

The Top Sites feature is new. It shows a cool graphic of your recent and most frequently used websites.

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Click the icon to open that site. The Edit button on the bottom left allows you to customize the Top Sites screen, moving the icons and setting the size and layout.

History now works like CoverFlow, showing you pictures of where you've been, making it a lot easier to find that site when you can't remember its name.

At this point, Joe answered questions. The topics that came up:

Spaces

Spaces works in conjunction with Exposé, and the System Preferences for them are grouped. Each "space" is a virtual screen. F8 becomes the Spaces button. You have up to 16 spaces, shown as boxes. You can drag applications from one box (space) to another when you're setting it up.

Why? It's a way of organizing your workspace so that the things you use together are all together on one space and out of the way when you're in another space. Think of separating your word processing and writing tools from your email distractions.

Avoid Missing Hard Drive Shock

When you first open Snow Leopard, the first thing you'll notice is that your hard drive icon is missing! Don't be alarmed. If you want the icon back in the upper right corner, open View Options in the Finder and click a box telling it you want View HD on the Desktop.

How to install?

Joe says it doesn't matter whether you install the new OS over the old or do a clean install. But either way, make a good backup and then follow the Macintosh Systems Solutions steps to avoid trouble! (See page 5.)

Note that Appletalk is gone with Snow Leopard, replaced by Bonjour.

All the Adobe products work but Adobe only supports CS4 products under Snow Leopard. You can run the older ones but you won't get support if you need it.

Anything old, unusual or pirated may have problems under the new OS. If you use Parallels, you'll need to upgrade it. See the orange box for more info.

DON'T GO IN THERE

The question was asked: why are these so many folders called Library, and what should we do with them?

Joe says not to mess with the Library folders! At the root level, the Library folder holds things the OS needs which relate to all users of the machine. Under each user there is a Library holding things that pertain only to that user. And there's a third Library inside the System folder, holding things relevant to the System. In all cases, the contents of these folders is set by the System, needed by the System and should not be changed in any way by the user!!



About Incompatible Software

Mac OS X v10.6 Snow Leopard is designed to protect your Mac from certain incompatible software that can quit unexpectedly or cause other issues in Mac OS X v10.6.

When you install Snow Leopard or migrate to Snow Leopard, known-incompatible software is moved to a folder named Incompatible Software on your hard drive.

Snow Leopard also prevents known-incompatible software from opening. If you see an "Incompatible software" message, contact the software's vendor or visit their website for a later, compatible version. More info:

Microsoft Admits to Copying Apple Mac User Interface

In a move sure to have Microsoft's legal eagles tearing their hair out, Microsoft Partner Group Manager Simon Aldous, during an interview with Britain's Intent Media's PCR publication, acknowledged that Microsoft has been aiming to "create a Mac look and feel."

"What we've tried to do with Windows 7...is create a Mac look and feel in terms of graphics."

Catching up with Aldous at the Microsoft partner conference at London's Wembley Stadium, a PCR staffer asked Aldous about, among other things, Windows 7. Aldous explained that "One of the things that people say an awful lot about the Apple Mac is that the OS is fantastic, that it's very graphical and easy to use."

Aldous then went on to say that "What we've tried to do with Windows 7 - whether it's traditional format or in a touch format - is create a Mac look and feel in terms of graphics."

He also explained that "We've significantly improved the graphical user interface, but it's built on that very stable core Vista technology, which is far more stable than the current Mac platform, for instance."

We're not sure what he means by suggesting that the Mac platform (predicated on Unix) is somehow less than stable, but after this gaffe, we're guessing that it's more stable than Aldous' future with Microsoft. You can read the full PCR interview with Aldous here:

How to Protect Your Privacy Online with Safari in Mac OS X Snow Leopard

Even Mac users sometimes need to take steps to protect their privacy. Snow Leopard lets you protect Safari against both outside intrusion from the Internet and from prying eyes around your Mac. Protecting your privacy involves a few simple settings.

TIP: Although it's small, the padlock icon that appears at the top of the Safari window when you're connected to a secure Web site means a great deal! A secure site encrypts the information that you send and receive, making it much harder for unscrupulous crooks to obtain credit card numbers and personal information. You can click the padlock icon (next to the site name) to display the security certificate in use on that particular site.

Limit cookies

In and of themselves, cookies aren't bad things. Unlike a virus, a cookie file isn't going to replicate itself or wreak havoc on your system, and only the original site can read the cookie that it creates. However, many folks don't appreciate acting as a gracious host for a slew of little snippets of personal information. (Not to mention that some cookies have highly suggestive names, which could lead to all sorts of conclusions. End of story.)

You can choose to accept or reject all cookies by choosing Safari Prefences and then clicking the Security toolbar button.

Clean your cache

Safari speeds up the loading of Web

sites by storing often-used images and multimedia files in a temporary storage, or cache, folder. Naturally, the files in your cache folder can be displayed (hint), which could lead to assumptions about the sites you've been visiting.

Luckily, Safari makes it easy to dump the contents of your cache file. Just choose Safari Empty Cache; then click Empty to confirm that you want to clean up your cache.

Delete browsing history


As you might imagine, your History file leaves a very clear set of footprints indicating where you've been on the Web. To delete the contents of the History menu, choose History Clear History (at the very bottom of the History menu).

Safari also allows you to specify an amount of time to retain entries in your History file. Open the Safari Preferences dialog, click the General tab, and then click the Remove History Items pop-up menu to specify the desired amount of time. Items can be rolled off daily, weekly, biweekly, monthly, or yearly.

Avoid pop-up ads

To block most of those pop-up windows with advertisements for everything from low-rate mortgages to "sure-thing" Internet casinos, click the Safari menu and verify that Block Pop-Up Windows is selected. (If it's not selected, click the menu item to toggle it on.)

The Best Camera Is The One That's With You: iPhone Photography by Chase Jarvis



A beacon of creativity with boundless energy, Chase Jarvis is well known as a visionary photographer, director, and social artist. In this book, Chase reimagines, examines, and redefines the intersection of art and popular culture through images shot with his iPhone.

This book is geared to inspire everyone, regardless of their level of photography knowledge, that you can capture moments and share them with our friends, families, loved ones, or the world at the press of a button.


TIPS FROM TOM:

With the recent release of OS X update 10.6, I would like to remind everyone of the proper procedures for installing a operating system update for your Mac.

First, you should always check the "health" of the directory structure on your hard drive by running Disk Utility/Repair Disk from the restore Disk that came with your computer (it is under Utilities in the menu bar when you start on the restore disk{CMD & C}, available after the first page).

After checking the health of your hard drive, it is most important to perform a current backup of your drive (you do backup, don't you?) before con≠tinuing.

Once the Repair Disk process and Backup are completed and there are no errors reported (run Repair Disk at least twice, until you get two sequential reports of No Errors), the first thing to



do when shut down is to disconnect everything but the keyboard and mouse from your system--yes-- Everything but the keyboard and mouse!

Now restart your computer normally, assure that all applications are 'quit' (nothing but the Finder and Dashboard should have little triangles under them in the Dock).

Now you can go to the Software Update function under the Apple and start the update procedures. At this point, once you have started the update and agreed to any licensing, it is im≠perative that you walk away from your computer like it is a hive of angry killer bees. Do not touch your system while the update(s) are downloading and installing. Only respond to prompts from your system. Once it is safe to restart, do so and again step away while updates are completed. Please note that it is normal for several restarts to take place at this point, and it is also normal for these restarts to take longer than normal. After your system reboots back to a normal desktop and all updating processes are completed, it is now safe to once again use your system.

Never, ever use your computer when a Operating System (or other Apple supplied) updates are being run.
