Terminology

Joe started off with terminology, because knowing what things are called makes it so much easier to ask the questions you might have!

This is the operating system called SNOWLEOPARD, which comes on every new Mac these days. Once you've taken the Mac out of the box and answered the setup questions, this is what you'll see. The FINDER is the program that controls everything, it runs the computer. It also helps you find things; hence the name.

The DESKTOP is the pretty purple galaxy area you see. Across the top is the MENU BAR, where the pull-down menus and settings live. Across the bottom you

see the DOCK, which you customize to hold all your programs and frequently used items.

To expressly bring up the FINDER, click the Finder icon in the bottom left of the DOCK. This opens a WINDOW. Don't be confused, this is not the Windows Operating System, it's just a way of looking into your Mac.

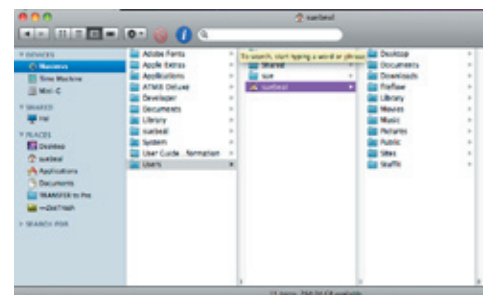

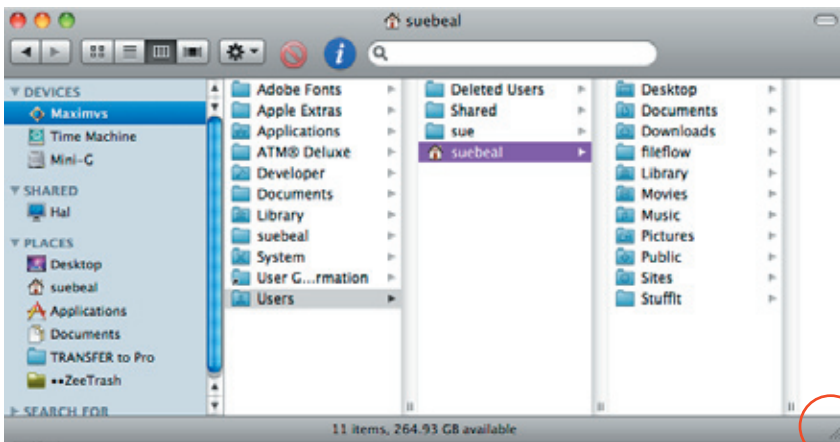


We had 44 people show up for our August meeting! We saw some faces we haven't seen in years, and good number of new faces as well!



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COLUMN VIEW

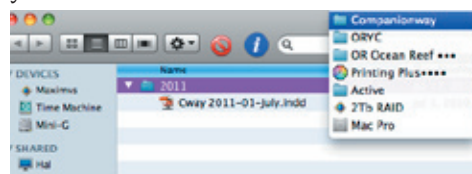
To reposition a window, use the mouse to put your cursor over the fat grey bar at the top of the window, CLICK and hold the button down as you DRAG the window where you'd like it to be. Let go when it's in the right place. If it's too big or too small, click and drag the three little diagonal marks you see in the bottom right corner of the window frame (see red circle above). Drag diagonally in or out to resize.

The blue column on the left side of the window is called the SIDEBAR. It shows you places in your computer that you might want to go. First listed are your DEVICES, which might show just your computer itself (the one above is named Maximvs). If you have other hard drive attached, you'll see them listed there as well. If you click once on any of those items in the list, the contents of the window will change to show you a view into that Device.

PLACES, also listed in the SIDEBAR, is a list of frequently used FOLDERS. Folders are how you organize things on your Mac. Some folders are there when you first get your computer; you may create more folders and even folders within

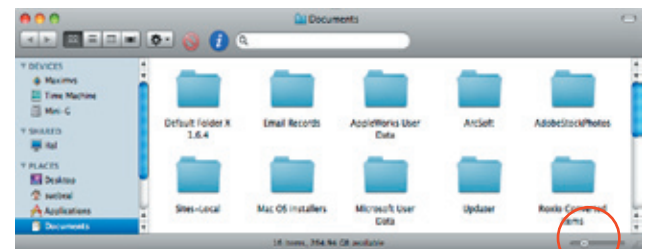
folders, in order to keep all your documents organized.

At the top of the window, you have some very useful items. The top center shows the name of the folder you are currently looking into. Hold down the Command key and click on that name and you'll see the hierarchy of folders that got you there.

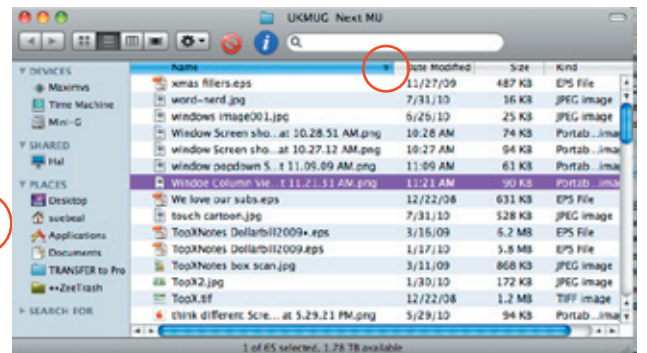


In the upper left corner you see three colored buttons: red, yellow and green. The red button CLOSES the window, the yellow MINIMIZES it, which means it gets really small and goes down into the DOCK for temporary storage, and the green one resizes it to an optimum size for the contents.

Below that is a row of squarish buttons. The two on the



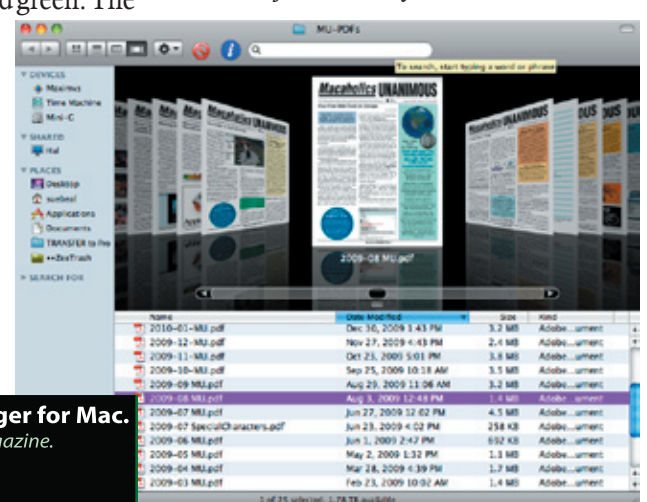
ICON VIEW



LIST VIEW

left are for navigating - back (points left) and forward (points right). If it's grayed out, that direction is not an option at the moment.

Next to that are the VIEW buttons. These are fun to play with! The leftmost one looks like 4 boxes. This is for ICON VIEW, the one that looks like a set of lines is LIST VIEW, the third button is COLUMN VIEW, and the last is COVER FLOW. Each view is useful in its own way. If you are spacially oriented, you may like having the icons just where you want them.



COVER FLOW VIEW

You may find it useful to have bigger or smaller icons. Use the little slider in the bottom right corner of the window frame for sizing the icons (see red circle, above.).

If you are looking for something, List View helps you find it quickly. Click on any of the headings (Name, Date Modified, Size, etc.) and the list will sort on that attribute. Click again on the title and the sort

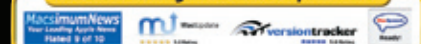

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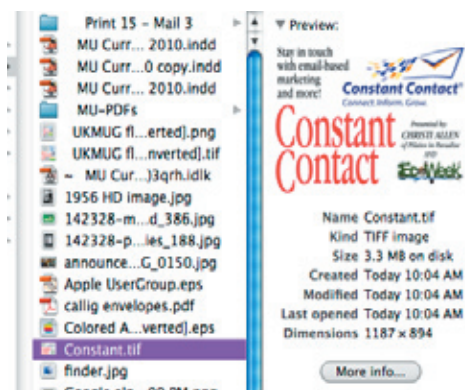


switches order (from oldest to most recent, or from smallest first to largest first). See the little triangle in the column heading? That tells you what you're currently sorting on and the direction of the sort.

And there are more triangles in List View for you to use! Any folder you see in List View has a little triangle to the left of the folder icon. Click the triangle and you'll see the contents on that folder listed down below. (Look at the window to the right.)

The bottom center of the window tells how many items are in the current window, and shows how much free space you have on your hard drive.

You can use the ARROW KEYS to navigate in any window - up, down, left, or right. When you get all the way to the end and focus on a single item in Column view, you get a big icon and lots of information about the item you're viewing.

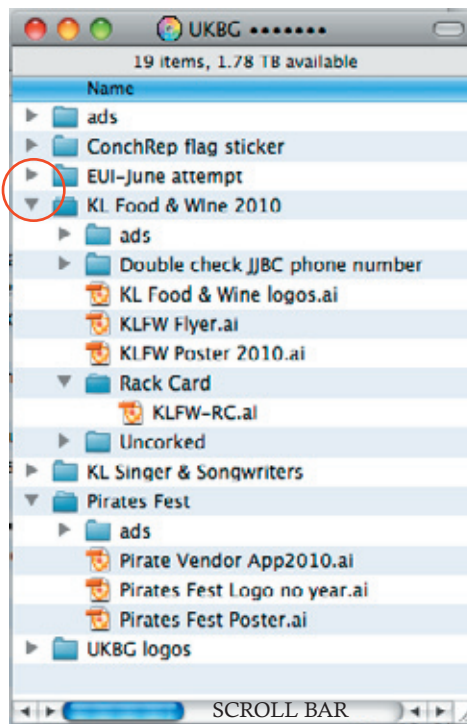


COVERFLOW is the most visually exciting of the views, the fourth button. Its name comes from iTunes, where it was invented for flipping through the album covers in your music collection. You can use it to visually flip through large previews of your documents, and in many cases, to look into those documents or play movies without even opening a program! If a multipage document comes up in Cover Flow view, just click on it. You'll get two extra arrows to navigate through the pages!

SCROLL BARS are located on the right side and bottom of any window that has more information than it can show you. When you see the scroll bars, there's more to look at. Drag the blue bubble down, up or across to see more of the contents. On a track pad this is a "2-fingered drag."

More Viewing Options

Select any item or a group of items and hit the space bar. This is called QUICK VIEW. You get an expanded view, a preview if it's

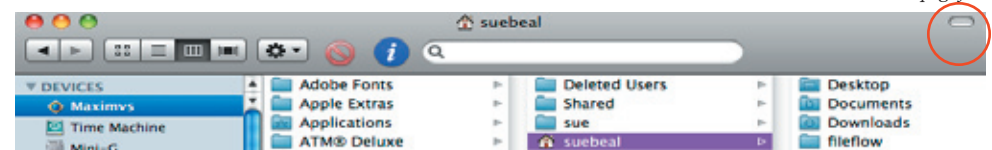


available and more information. Hit the space bar again to make it go away.

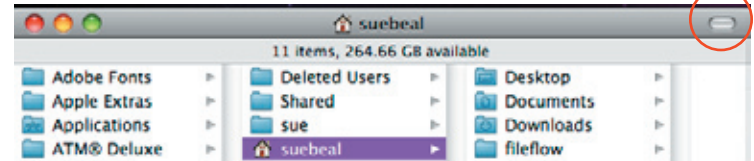
Selecting Items

Here's how you select items: you click once on an icon to select it. If you want to select more than one you can hold down the Command key (That's the one just to the left or right of the space bar.) While holding the Command key, click on additional items. Picked up one you didn't want? Command click it again and it drops out of the selection.

Another way to select items, if you're in icon view, is to click and hold down the mouse button, then drag diagonally across a bunch of items. All of them will be selected.



Click to little bubble in the upper right of the window to make the header and sidebar go away and reappear.



New to the Mac? Here's a guide that might help

- ⌘ is the Command (or Apple) key located next to the space bar on both sides on most Mac keyboards.
- ⌥ is the Option (or Alt) key located next to the Command keys on both sides on most Mac keyboards.
- ⌘ is the Control key located next to the Option keys on both sides on most Mac keyboards.
- ⇧ is the Shift key located above the Control key on both sides on most Mac keyboards.

Drag and Drop

To move items, click and hold with them selected, drag them to the destination. Look for the destination to change to indicate you "hit" it, then let go. This is called DRAG and DROP.

When you are carrying some items and hover over a folder and it pops open and shows you its contents, it's called SPRING LOADED FOLDERS. This is a nice shortcut when you're trying to figure out where to put something.

If you make a mistake and drop what you're "holding" when you didn't mean to... and of course, it disappears and you have no idea what you just did (!)... don't panic. The Finder has UNDO! You can select "undo" from the Edit Menu or use Command-Z. This will put things back where they were, and you can try again.

Keyboard Shortcuts

Almost everything in the Finder can be done through the menus or through a command-Key shortcut. To learn the shortcut, just look beside the command on the menu.

What's up with those cat names?

Since System 10, Apple has started nicknaming its system releases with cat names. We're not sure why, either!



However, here's how it works. Every MAJOR major release gets a number, We're up to 10, now, affectionately known as "X."

Within System X, each release gets its own second number and cat name. 10.2 was

Jaguar, 10.3 was Panther, 10.4 was Tiger, 10.5 was Leopard, and the current one is 10.6, which is Snow Leopard. Within each release are minor revisions, called 10.6.2 or 10.6.3 (identified by the 3rd number. You pay to go from major release to major release; the minor revisions are free and available through an automatic process called SOFTWARE UPDATE. Generally, these minor revisions just fix security issues and minor bugs, but it's a good idea to apply them when Software Update prompts you to do so. It checks weekly to see if there's anything you should do, and it lets you know.

When you decide to apply a minor revision, back up first, quit out of all of your programs before downloading and installing, and don't use your computer for anything else until you're done with the install.

How do I know what system I have?

See that Apple in the upper left hand corner of your screen? Pull down that menu and select "About this Mac." It will tell you that, and lots more if you click the "More Info" button. There's even a button there to start a manual Software Update if you like!



System Preferences

Also under the Apple Menu you'll find Systems Preferences. (On a PC they call this a Control Panel.) In this window are settings for so many things that control how you use your Mac!

Change your desktop image (PC: Wallpaper), change how your mouse responds, set up a screen saver, set up an RSS News feed (in your screen saver!), set how you want the Dock to behave, set up network-



ing, display/monitor behaviors, keyboard options, accounts & security... and so much more!

How does the Trash Can work?

When you want to delete something from your computer, you drag it and drop it into the Trash Can at the right hand side of the Dock. It stays in there until you empty the Trash, which is a command under the Finder Menu. It's ok to let things sit in the Trash, unless you are concerned about having enough space on your hard drive. If you find you mistakenly deleted something, you can open the Trash and take it out, as long as it hasn't been emptied.

A discussion ensued about securely emptying the Trash and getting items back that have been deleted after you've emptied the trash. Here's the bottom line:

If you're concerned about security, use the "Secure Empty Trash" command. If you use that command, it's really and truly gone afterwards. (And, if you're deleting a lot of items, this can take a while!)

If you use the regular "Empty Trash" command, and you mess up and delete something you shouldn't have, (and it's a major problem worth spending money to fix,) shut down your computer immediately and call Macintosh Systems Solutions. But try not to get in that position! Make regular backups and don't put anything in the Trash you're not sure about deleting.

Speaking of Backing Up

Time Machine is the operating system's built-in backup function. To use it, you hook up an additional hard drive, designated for Time Machine's use only. It takes a backup

of everything on your main hard drive, then updates it periodically with just what's changed since the last backup. This allows you to go back in time and find something you used to have! Select it and hit Restore, and you get it back! Magic!


What's on Your New Mac

The Mac comes with the Operating System (whatever is current when the box is packed), Email (called MAIL), Contacts, iCal (Calendaring), Safari Web Browser, Adobe Acrobat, iPhoto, iMovie, iTunes, and Garage Band (for composing music).

What's not there: Word Processing, Spreadsheet and Presentation software. For that you can buy the Microsoft Suite for the Mac at \$446, or you can get iWork for \$79. iWork has Pages (for Word Processing and Page Layout), Numbers (for spreadsheet) and Keynote (for presentations). Apple's programs work with Microsoft's document formats, so you should be able to pull up documents from your old computer and go forward with them.

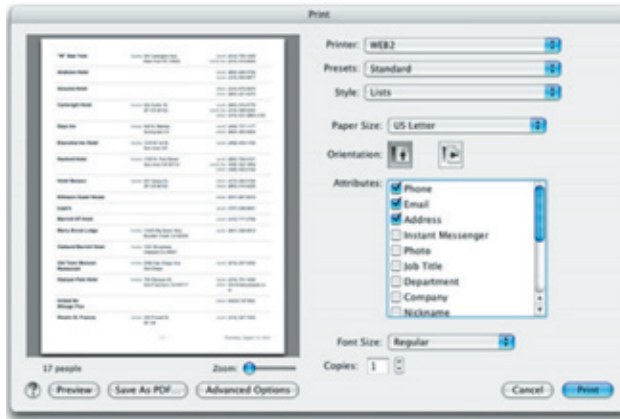


Address Book Printing Tip

Now click on the "Save As PDF" button, and Address Book will create a beautiful .pdf file with all of your contact information, which you can read on any computer. [MU](#)



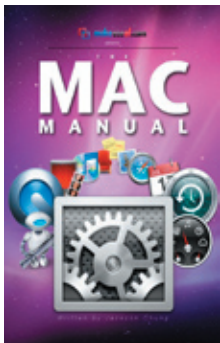
Protecting Your Privacy

Some clipart collections and sites now provide images as PDF files. These work fine in Pages and other places, but often you need to convert the image to a JPEG or other format to use on Web sites or to adjust colors. You can perform this conversion with only Preview. Just open the PDF in Preview and select File, Save As. You now have the option to choose a format such as JPEG or the more versatile PNG.

I also find Preview useful when I get an AI or EPS file too sophisticated for my version of Adobe Illustrator. I open it in Preview and save it as a PDF, then drag the PDF and drop it onto Illustrator. It usually opens just fine then!—Sue [MU](#)

Let the iPhone be your guide at New York's Natural History museum

If you've ever had to navigate through an expansive museum like the Louvre or the Air & Space Museum, you've probably experienced at least one moment of disorientation, intimidation, or downright frustration brought on by the sheer magnitude and labyrinthine layout of these enormous institutions. The American Museum of Natural History in New York wants to put an end to that frustration, and it's turning to the iPhone to help get the job done.

The museum's AMNH Explorer app turns your iPhone and iPod touch into a virtual tour guide. The free app tracks your location in the museum and offers turn-by-turn directions to exhibits, bathrooms, cafes, and giftshops.

AMNH Explorer provides photos and information on exhibits at New York's American Museum of Natural History as well as a detailed map of your current location.

With 45 permanent exhibition halls alongside theaters, cafes, and gift shops, the museum is one the largest in the world. Visitors can explore more than 500,000 square feet over four levels, so it isn't hard to see how a mobile companion can come in handy. I had a chance to take AMNH Explorer for a test drive around the American Museum of Natural History during a press event this week to show off the newly released app.

While AMNH Explorer is available through the App Store, the museum will also make it available to visitors who don't have an iPhone or iPod touch handy. The museum will keep a stockpile of 350 iPod touches to loan out for free; visitors just have to provide an ID.

During my visit to the museum next to Central Park, I downloaded the Explorer app onto my iPhone 3GS and connected to the museums' free wireless network. The museum refers to the app's location tracking abilities as "indoor GPS," but it actually relies on a dense network of Wi-Fi hot spots to triangulate your location. This allows the app to better track your location inside the building, and, more important, determine what floor you're on.

While your experience with the AMNH Explorer ideally starts at your home, where you can peruse the exhibits and set up your own customized tour of the museum, the app makes it easy to dive right in and start exploring when you're on-site. The home screen offers a simple directory from which you can find exhibits, embark on a museum tour, find food and shops, or find restrooms and exits. I tapped on the Find Exhibits button and had the app lead me to the museum's famed Tyrannosaurus rex skeleton. The app provided me with a map of my current room, and turn by turn instructions to get me to the exhibit.

In addition to serving as a guide, the Explorer also provides interesting facts and tidbits of information on more than 140 specimens and objects on display. Eventually, the app will offer audio tours of the museum.



You can mark exhibits as "visited," or bookmark exhibits so you can learn more about them at home. If you'd rather not put together your own tour, the Explorer includes its own pre-packaged tours, such as the Dino Tour and the Highlights Tour. It also features a fossil treasure hunt in which you are directed to hunt for pictured items at certain exhibits, and includes social media links for sharing pictures and comments about the museum on Facebook or Twitter.

App Support Team members are dispersed throughout the museum to help visitors use the Explorer app.

I left the American Museum of Natural History feeling thoroughly satisfied with the app's performance, and think it will truly enhance the experience of any visitor to the museum. But perhaps even more exciting than the effectiveness of the app itself is the glimpse into the future it provides ... a future where our smartphones will not only guide us around the city, but also through our museums, libraries, hospitals, and shopping centers. **MU**

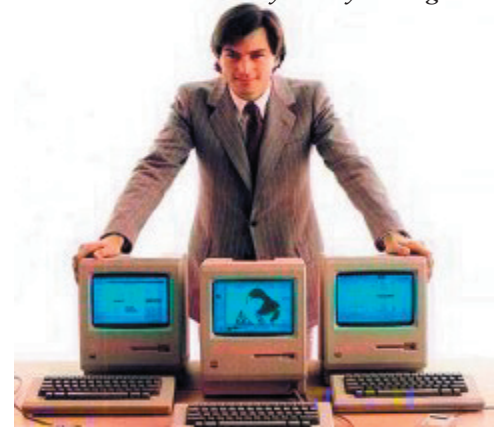


100 Things You Didn't Know About Apple & Steve Jobs

12. Steve Jobs bought Pixar from George Lucas for \$10 million and sold it to Disney for \$7.6 billion.
13. Steve Jobs has four children: one son and three daughters.
14. Jonathan Ive has twins.
15. Steve Jobs originally denied he was the father of his first child, Lisa Brennan-Jobs.
16. Steve Jobs sold his apartment in New York City to U2 frontman Bono.
17. In 1998 Steve Jobs let Bill Clinton use his mansion in Woodside, California.
18. Steve Jobs underwent a liver transplant at a hospital in Memphis, Tennessee in 2009.
19. Apple was established on April Fools Day.

Synching Tip

I use www.dropbox.com all the time - keeps my PC laptop and my iMac in sync. You get two GBs free at signup.
