The Latest and Greatest from Apple

It was great to have Jack Buccellato back in front of the room at UKMUG this month!

He started off by putting our minds at ease about the recent spate of China-originated bugs and viruses infecting iPhones. Jack said that you have to go to a third party store and/or jailbreak your device to have it be exposed. And, Apple has patched the problem now, so we are not likely to be affected in any way. He stresses that you should always be watching for a con, watch for anything that doesn't seem right, and if it seems "off," don't click on it!

He asked how many in the room had upgraded to Yosemite, and about 7-8 people had, about 16%.

He said it's safe now to do it, as long as you backup - backup - backup first. He says it multiple times because you should do it at more than once, to different places. Maybe once in the cloud, and once to an external drive. Or more. Burn a DVD. What could an extra backup hurt?

He also said to clean up your machine. He didn't go into detail, but I'm guessing you know best where you might need to tidy things up. I don't know about you, but I like to back up BEFORE I clean up... and then again after (not rewriting over the first backup). That way, if I got carried away with the cleaning part, I can go to the pre-clean-up backup and find the things I mistakenly deleted.

And the final thing he mentioned that you need to do before upgrading, is your "due diligence." It seems to me that this

part comes first, really, before you make the decision to upgrade. It comes in a couple parts. You need to know if your machine is capable of running the upgrade (more on this below). And you need to know what is going to happen with your favorite apps when you update. Do you have to buy a new Quicken, or Adobe Suite? Expenses like these will factor into your decision to take on the "free" upgrade.

When you decide to do it, Jack says it takes about 20-25 minutes on a good connection to download Yosemite, another 20-25 to install, and then once you start it up it takes a while (depending an the amount of data you have on your drive(s)), to run all its indexing for Spotlight. To start the process, go the the App Store and look for the mountain picture that represents Yosemite. Click the "Free" button.

While it's possible to revert back to a previous OS after installing Yosemite, it's not easy, so make sure when you do the upgrade, you're ready for it.

or Lion, it will run Yosemite, BUT lack of memory and the wrong video card can bring you down. You need a Radeon card, and even these sometimes have problems. Jack says usually a 2010 model or younger will be ok. If you're borderline, add as much memory as you can. A solid state hard drive can also greatly speed up an old machine. Yosemite is robust, and if your machine isn't up to it, it's going to be slower than you like.

Jack suggests a solid state drive. Recycle the old spinning drive for backing up. He was asked about the hybrid "fusion drive," and said that he is not a fan.

What's in the new OS?

Jack has been stressing the concept of the convergence of mobile and desktop computing for several years, and he says, with Yosemite, it has arrived. He showed a cool 60-second movie very quickly showing the new features. You can see it at http://ukmug.pbworks.com/w/page/5624170/Meeting (you need Keynote). Scroll down, it's the first thing under the November 2014 heading.

Handoff

Once of the new features is Handoff. This allows you to pick up where you left off, from one device to another. When your devices are near each other, they can automatically hand off activities to each other. For example, if you're writing an email on your iPhone and walk up to your Mac, your email is ready for you to pick up on your Mac exactly where you left off.

Handoff works with Mail, Safari, Maps, Messages, Reminders, Calendar, Contacts, Notes, Keynote, Numbers, and Pages. You can hand off an activity from your Mac to your iPhone or iPad, or from your iPhone

or iPad to your Mac.

Handoff is tied to your Apple ID, so if you and the wife and family have been sharing one, it might be time to get separate IDs. More on this later.

Interface

The new Yosemite interface is "thinner" with flatter icons and cleaner type. More like what we've become used to on the iPhone.

Jack particularly likes that you can make your background black and the type white. Reducing the glare is easier on the eyes for those who spend many hours at a screen.

Safari

The new Safari has a streamlined toolbar that puts powerful browsing tools at your fingertips, while freeing space for your web pages. You can scroll through your open tabs with a gesture or view them all in one window with the new Tab view. You can access your favorite sites with the new Favorites view, which stays in sync across all your devices. With easier sharing, better search tools, and energy-saving technologies, Safari is the "smartest" way to browse the web.

Your favorite sites stay in sync on your iPad and iPhone, so no matter which de-

vice you have, your favorites are with you, and sharing web pages from Safari is now easier. The people you've recently shared with appear in the Share menu, and Safari also remembers how you shared with that person — via Mail or Messages — so you can quickly share the same way again. In addition, third-party developers can create extensions that allow you to customize your Share menu with new services and social networks.

Mail

Email on a Mac gets even better with Yosemite. With the new Markup feature, you can quickly annotate an image or PDF attachment. You can also fill out a form and even include your signature, then send it back — without leaving Mail. It's almost like having a mini Photoshop/Photobooth built into Mail.

Mail Drop

A new feature called Mail Drop lets you send large attachments without worrying about whether they'll be held up by your service provider.

When you're signed in to iCloud, Mail Drop lets you send large files like videos, presentations, even a folder of im-

ages without having to worry about your service provider's limitations. Just drag your attachments, up to 5GB total, into your mail message, and Mail Drop handles the rest. If your recipients use Mail in OS X Yosemite, they'll receive the attachment just as they do today. If they use another app or webmail, they'll receive your email with a link to download it. There's no charge to use Mail Drop, and it works no matter which email service you use.

Messages

So many ways to start a conversation! You can send unlimited text messages to anyone with a Mac or an iOS device using iMessage. You can have group conversations with two or more friends. If you have an iPhone, you can send SMS text messages from your Mac to friends, no matter what kind of phone they have.

And now, every message on your iPhone appears on your Mac.

Soundbite.

Sometimes it's nicer for them to hear what you're saying than to read it. Record a quick audio clip of your voice and send it to friends without leaving the Messages app.

New ways to control the conversation.

Now you can add titles to Messages conversations so they're easier to find and keep track of. If your friends are sharing their locations from their iOS devices, see a map of where they are at that moment. When you're having a group conversation with three or more participants, you can add and remove people, or even remove yourself from the conversation (all participants need to be on Mavericks, Yosemite or iOS8). You can stop notifications from any messaging session or browse all the photos and videos within any message thread. To access all these features, open the new Details view.

Family Sharing

Jack says, "Apple heard you." Family Sharing makes it easy for up to six people in your family to share each other's iTunes, iBooks, and App Store purchases without sharing accounts. Whenever one family member buys a new song, movie, book, or app, everybody in the family group can enjoy it, too. You can also share photos, a family calendar, and more to help keep everyone connected.

That said, it doesn't sound like it's going to be easy or even possible to combine existing accounts into a Family, or to separate them when you've been sharing. Might take a while to sort out.

But for new families setting it up, it's great. Family members get immediate access to each other's purchased music, movies, TV shows, books, and apps. Browse everyone's libraries and download what you want with a click anytime you like. Because all family members use their own Apple IDs, there's no need to share accounts or passwords.


Parental Controls Still in Place

Parents get more control, while kids feel like they have more freedom. Enjoy the convenience of paying for family purchases with a single credit card. Enable "Ask to Buy" to review iTunes, iBooks, and App Store purchases requested by children before completing them. You can even create Apple IDs for children under 13 years old so they can participate, too.

Finder

Store any file in iCloud Drive. Then find it on any device. "Welcome to your place in the cloud." Located in the Finder, iCloud Drive lets you store all types of

files, organize them the way you like, and access them from all your devices.

iCloud Drive works like any other folder on your Mac. Just drag and drop files right into it. Changes you make on one device are made on all your other devices, and your files are always available on your Mac and iOS devices, even when you're offline. Changes you make offline are synced when you connect to the Internet.

You've got all kinds of files on your Mac. Keeping track of them is easier with iCloud Drive. You can create additional folders within iCloud Drive and add tags so you know what's what. Rearrange it however you want. With iCloud Drive, you can always find the latest version of a file on your iPhone, iPad, Mac, or PC, and also at iCloud.com.

That's a quick summary of the new features in Yosemite. Then Jack went on to talk about iOS8.

What's New in iOS8

- Quickly find and edit the photos you take.
- Add your voice right in a text message.
- Let your health and fitness apps communicate with each other, with your trainer, and even with your doctor.
- New keyboard options and even more ways to share your content.
- Use iCloud and Touch ID in ways you never have before.

Jack: On the Importance of Backups

(We can't say this enough!)

If something is important to you BACK IT UP. Photos, contacts, financial information, records. Make a copy somewhere other than where it normally is stored. Several backups are better than one.

Put it on a thumb drive, an external hard drive, burn a DVD, and/or send it into the cloud.

Critical information should be backed up outside your home or office. If there's a fire or flood in the primary location, you still have an offsite copy.

Do it today. You will not be sorry!

Photos.

The all-new Photos app makes it simpler than ever to find and rediscover your favorite photos with new search features and smart albums that organize your photos for you. And you can make every shot look even better immediately after you've taken it with powerful new editing tools, no matter your skill level. And iCloud Photo Library, in beta, stores every photo and video you take, making them accessible from your iPhone, iPad, and iPod touch.

iCloud and iOS 8.

iCloud is built into iOS. It makes sure your devices always have the latest versions of your documents, apps, contacts, and more. It even helps you track lost devices.

Family Sharing.

Up to six people in your household can easily share each other's purchases from iTunes, iBooks, and the App Store. You can also keep up with each other's photos, calendars, locations, and more.

Starting to sound familiar? That's because iOS8 and Yosemite are converging!

GoPro.com is another great site for inspiration. When I entered the word puppies, I wasted, I mean spent, an hour watching video after video and whimpering with delight. After slapping myself to get on with writing this article, I decided on this heart-warming video, "Duncan the Dog," which is just over 4 minutes, for my example. For my final search, I chose the word music. The example is perfect for either the Music or Humor category. You can search online for "how to make a movie with iMovie" to find numerous instructional videos and slideshows. Or ask your kids, grandkids or the neighbor kid for help!

We hope you will share your story. Tell us your story in 6 minutes or less. Be adventurous! Add a title, film credits and background music. Format it as video or in a slideshow. Content should be appropriate for all audiences. Submit your entry as a QuickTime video file burned onto a CD-R or DVD-R disc.

Films will be screened on February 12, 2015, at the monthly UKMUG meeting. Judging will take place right after the screening. Awards will be given for the best in each of six genres as well as for Best in Show.

The iPhone has become something of a darling among professional photographers — inspiring competitive photography contests, photos of candid moments from within the White House, and praise from even the globetrotting photographers of National Geographic.

And when it comes to accomplished photographers, David Hume Kennerly ranks pretty high. The photojournalist has captured the Vietnam War, the "Fight of the Century" between Muhammad Ali and Joe Frazier, and Gerald Ford's presidency. He had already won a Pulitzer Prize for his work before he turned 30.

Given those credentials, you might be surprised to hear that Kennerly's latest work is a book dedicated to the art of the iPhone photo.
