A step into the future: iOS5

Our November meeting was well-attended with a lot of new faces and everyone excited about the new operating system for our mobile devices, iOS5. A few people had the newest iPhone, the 4S, and there was plenty of buzz about that as well.

We were pleased to welcome Jack Buccellato back as our speaker. He began by saying not to worry about what you do with your mobile device, don't be afraid you'll hurt it. Explore and get excited about it! That excitement was the theme for the night.



One of the first topics that came up was AirPlay. With AirPlay, you can wirelessly stream what's on your iPhone, iPad, or iPod touch to your HDTV and speakers via Apple

TV. Or mirror your iPad 2 or iPhone 4S screen. All you do is press the AirPlay button and tell it where to send the signal.

A new concept (for me, at least) was "geo-fencing." A geo-fence is a virtual perimeter for a real-world

geographic area. Think of it as a radius around a store or other location. When the location-aware device enters or exits a geo-fence, it receives a notification. That makes the device aware of where it is, and it can generate a reminder or other notification to the user. In plain English, when Jack needs to remember to pick up milk on the way home, he can have his iPhone pop up and remind him when he is passing Winn Dixie!

Again, Jack mentioned "convergence," which was a big part of his presentation for the group a few months back. The idea is that the integration of technology in our lives is easy, seamless and ubiquitous. AirPlay and geo-fencing are a part of that concept.

Siri is the newest piece of the convergence puzzle. Siri on iPhone 4S lets you use your voice to send messages, schedule meetings, place phone calls, and more. Ask Siri to do things just by talking to her. Siri understands what you say, knows what you mean, and even talks back. This goes beyond voice recognition to understanding context. Jack told us the intelligence continued on page two

behind Siri started with the military and DARPA, at the Stanford Research Institure (SRI). Hence the name SiRI. Watch the Apple video on Siri: <u>http://www.apple.com/iphone/features/siri.html</u>

iPhone and iOS5 features

The new iPhone 4S has an 8 megapixel camera and built-in HD video (1080p), with a true optical lens and LED flash. The camera is dual - on both sides, for chatting.

With iOS5 you can send yourself notifications and reminders, as well as messaging (SMS, text, etc.) - even from an iPod!

Think of it: kids could be given an iPod touch with parental controls - you can keep tabs on where they are and communicate with them - without giving them the full freedom of a phone. Works on any iPad, and on any iPod Touch from the 3rd generation and up.

iOS Updates

Someone asked how often does the OS get updated and where does one get updates? With iOS 5, the updates come in automatically when you connect to iTunes. Jack recommends being in control of when you update, so he turns off the automatic update and just does it manually. It's a good habit to wait a little while after any update to make sure it's stable before putting it on your device.

Check the Apple website, read about what in an update, then decide.

The Cloud

iCloud stores your music, photos, documents, backups, books and more... then wirlessly pushes them to your devices. You're already familiar with the concept. Yahoo, Gmail, Flickr and Picasa have all been doing this for some time. They all use the Cloud concept and they share data and information through the internet "automagically."

During Jack's talk I overheard some very cool comments. Jack mentioned something the iPhone could do and I overheard "Wow, I didn't know I could do that!" Someone started to ask a question, "How do I... Oh he just showed me (the man next to her). Oh, that's awesome!"

How cool is that? It's what UKMUG is about. Exciting!



Jack packed the house with 58 people, and a whole lot of them were new faces to UKMUG.

Your mobile Apple devices are connected through iCloud, and doing so allows you to keep everything in sync.

You have to be in the Lion OS on your desktop or laptop to have iCloud connect to your Mac. Jack can't disclose anything but says that those on Snow Leopard should not give up hope of being cloud-connected.

Some folks in the audience said that iCloud was working with their PC desktop/laptop operating system! I guess you'll have to Google it for more on that.

Remember that upgrading to Lion requires you to give up any legacy Rosetta software, and at the moment, you can't run Quickbooks or Quicken in Lion. Intuit is working on it, and the accounting packages should be available after the first of the year, but Jack's message is still to not rush into Lion unless you have to.

Independence from the Desktop

Here's where we see we've moved into the future. The desktop will be going away, eventually, as a home computer. Of course, professionals in various fields will still need them, but for the person needing photos, entertainment, email and internet.... mobile devices and the cloud can cover all your needs.


Security and the Cloud

Don't junk that desktop machine just yet, however. Someone asked if you really want your financial documents and other sensitive information in the Cloud. The answer is a resounding NO! Your sensitive documents don't belong on on your iPhone or iPad. They are too easily lost or stolen. It's ok to access your bank and online financial websites, as long as you use good, strong passwords.

And Jack mentioned the importance of offsite backups. If you have something that is so precious to you that you never want to lose it, make a copy and store that copy offsite - in a safe deposit box, or give it to a friend or family member. If fire or flood comes to your home, you'll have a way to retrieve it.

What about Entourage?

When this question was asked, there was a little silence, and I think I heard crickets. Jack said "Come over to the light side." Personally I have heard more than once that *continued on page 3*

Entourage on a Mac is not stable, and you risk losing all your contacts. If you persist in using it, please - back up regularly and thoroughly to protect yourself. And do come over to the light side!!

iTunes Match

With iCloud, the music you purchase in iTunes appears automatically on all your devices. You can also download your past iTunes purchases. Where you want, when you want.

For the benefits of iTunes in the Cloud for music you haven't purchased from iTunes, iTunes Match was created. It's built into iTunes and the Music App on your iOS devices. It lets you store your entire collection, including music you've imported from CDs or purchased somewhere other than iTunes, for \$24.99 a year.

Here's how it works: iTunes determines which songs in your collection are available in the iTunes Store. Any music with a match is automatically added to iCloud. Since there are more than 20 million songs in the iTunes Store, most of your music is probably there. All you have to upload is what iTunes can't match. Once your music is in iCloud, you can stream and store it on any of your devices. Even better, all the music iTunes matches plays back from iCloud at 256-Kbps AAC DRM-free quality — even if your original copy was of lower quality. It's not downloading, it's streaming.

Home Sharing

If you have WiFi, you can share music, movies and photos across devices in your home. Any computer can see and access content, and with AppleTV it's even better! In iTunes, go to the advanced menu and look through there to turn it on. iTunes also controls access to photos, similar to the way it hooks up your iPhoto library and your mobile devices.

iTunes Accounts

Jack mentioned that iTunes accounts are not meant to be shared among all members of a household, but with Home Sharing, you can still enjoy the other members' stuff. Setting limits for the kids and letting them do their own thing is probably a saner approach to keeping it all on one account.

Syncing

Putting your computer and mobile devices in sync is easy, but first think about how you use them and determine which should be the "master" and which the "slave." Or set it to update both, and prompt you to ask when there's a discrepancy. Put some thought into what works best for you. Face Time

Face Time is a video calling feature on the iPhone4 and up, and now you can make video calls to iPad 2, iPhone 4, the new iPod touch, or another Mac ... right from your Mac or phone.

Whenever you come across something interesting on the web, save it to Reading List. Then when you have more time to read articles, watch videos, or shop, your link-filled Reading List is ready and waiting. You can browse through the entire list or see just your unread pages. And the new Safari Reader lets you see it all in a clean, uncluttered space free from blinking, annoying ads.






